What Can Friends and Family Do? A Caregiver Responds

- Accept my feelings. They are real.
- Ask me about my family member's disease and how it affects me. Talking helps me make sense of this situation.
- Help me hope for tomorrow, but know that breakthroughs announced today may be too late for us.
- Call me. I'll let you know if I can't talk. Try later—phone calls are sometimes my only distraction.
- Send me newsletters, meeting announcements, and photos. I still feel a part of organizations even though I cannot attend meetings.
- Offer to take us anywhere. It's so much easier to take her out if there are two of us to help her.
- Talk to my loved one and don't be afraid to touch her. Even if she doesn't understand, she may respond to a smile and a kind word. I want you to visit, but please understand when your visit has to be cut short. She tires easily.
- Offer to run errands for me. Take her to the beauty shop or just take her out so I can get an uninterrupted nap.
- **Please don't argue** with her or offer rational explanations. It will just frustrate both of you. It is easier to change the subject.
- Believe me—her condition is as bad as I say it is, even though she looks and sounds good at times. It doesn't help for you to tell me that, "she looks fine to me."
- **Don't criticize** my approach to her. Experience is the best teacher. I already have enough doubts about my capacity to take care of her.
- I still have a sense of humor. When I tell you about the absurdities of our life, please don't be offended. Laughter is good medicine.
